

Help make Safe ‘Streets for All’ a Redondo Reality

REDONDO BEACH SCHOOLS ARE BACK IN SESSION

and that means thousands of tiny feet are once again pounding the pavement each morning as part of the Walking School Bus program. In fact, numbers indicate nearly 25 percent of elementary students in Redondo Beach are regularly walking to school – compared with just 11 percent nationally – and nearly all of Redondo Beach Unified School District’s 10,000 students live within walking or biking distance of school.

This marked uptick in foot traffic, coupled with 64 car crashes involving pedestrians or bicyclists near Redondo Beach schools from 2010 to 2013, is impelling Beach Cities Health District (BCHD) to step out with a public safety campaign, aimed at drivers, pedestrians and cyclists alike, fittingly dubbed “Streets for All.”

Streets for All, which officially rolled out in September, is the local interpretation of a regional effort by the Southern California Association of Governments to encourage people to walk and bike more. Streets for All focuses on spreading public education messages about street safety to residents of all ages and spotlighting the need for increased safety measures along highly-trafficked corridors like Prospect Avenue — which cuts through six school zones and impacts more than 5,500 Redondo Beach students on daily basis.


“As residents, we all share the responsibility to make Beach Cities streets safe for everyone, including those who use active transportation,” said Susan Burden, Beach Cities Health District CEO. “By creating safe spaces where people of all ages can walk, bike, scoot and stroll without fear, we put our entire community on the road to better overall health and safety. But we need the support and involvement of residents to make Streets for All a reality. This is where the rubber meets the road.”

Redondo Beach residents can get involved with the “Streets for All” campaign in a variety of ways, including:

- Picking up a Streets for All lawn sign at BCHD (1200 Del Amo St., Redondo Beach) from 9–11 a.m. on either Sept. 30, Oct. 1 or Oct. 3
- Volunteering at the Streets for All Community Rally & Door-knocking Day on Oct. 1 from 9 – 11 a.m.
- Sharing Streets for All messages on social media using #StreetsForAll and tagging BCHD on Facebook (Beach Cities Health), Twitter (@BCHD) and Instagram (@BeachCitiesHealth)



HOMEOWNER'S GUIDE FOR LEAF DISPOSAL

When cleaning up and disposing of leaves from the trees in your yard, there are things that you can do to protect our local waterways.

What's the problem with leaves?

Tree leaves contain extremely high amounts of nitrogen and phosphorus, which can be released when large amounts of leaves get into our waterways and decompose. This can cause algae blooms, which deplete the oxygen in the water and cause fish kills.

What can I do?

In Redondo Beach, homeowners are encouraged to prevent leaves from getting into the sidewalks, gutter and streets. If you do not already have a 35-65- or 95-gallon green curbside organic cart, request one from Athens Services at (888) 336-6100. The leaves that are collected from your yard can be placed in the cart so that they may be composted.

It's as easy as 1-2-3!

1. Collect leaves and put them into the green curbside organic cart for pick up and disposal.
2. Only fill the cart with leaves (no bags). Lids should not be open more than 3 inches and should not exceed a weight limit of 150 lbs.
3. Remember, you should never rake leaves into the curb/gutter or a storm drain!

Neighborhood Watch Program



A Guide to Neighborhood Watch Responsibilities



Want to know the best crime prevention device ever invented?

A good neighbor!

Want to know the best person to help assure neighborhood safety?

A friendly Neighborhood Watch Block Captain!

Throughout the years, Neighborhood Watch has grown from an "extra eyes and ears" approach to a much more proactive, community-oriented endeavor. Neighborhood Watch is based on the assumption that a group of people can come together and increase the safety of their neighborhood as they also increase their quality of life.

Block Captains: Responsible for Neighborhood Watch activities in your own block.

- Talk to neighbors, explaining the purpose of Neighborhood Watch and developing neighbor interest.
- Host a meeting of residents on the block. A Redondo Beach police officer will attend the meeting; answering questions and helping residents understand Neighborhood Watch as a community partnership with the Police Department.
- Develop and maintain an email or telephone tree for communication among neighbors.
- Serve as a liaison with their Neighborhood Watch Area Coordinator and/or the Police Department, communicating safety tips, crime statistics, crime prevention techniques such as home security and Operation Identification, plus disaster preparedness and self-sufficiency information.
- Arrange social events such as block parties and other activities that can help create a sense of community and mutual support.

Citizen Police Academy



The Redondo Beach Citizen Police Academy began in the spring of 1994. The Academy's purpose is to provide members of the community with a working knowledge of the Police Department along with the roles and responsibilities of its police officers. The goals of the program are accomplished through lecture, hands-on training, demonstrations and a "ride along" with a police officer.

The participants will meet for three hours, one night per week for fifteen weeks, in addition to a graduation night. The information covered includes police training, SWAT, traffic, criminal investigation, K-9, gangs and narcotics. There will be an emphasis on the patrol division, since it is this unit that has the majority of public contact.



The program is part of an on-going effort to improve police-community relations. It is strongly believed that the more information that the public has about the Redondo Beach Police Department, the less likely they will be suspicious, fearful or hold any misconceptions about police operations. Many conflicts are caused simply by a lack of understanding. The graduates of the program become not only better informed, but they can take back a solid foundation of information to the community. The result is a closer and more positive relationship between the Police Department and the community it serves.

The next class will begin January 2017. Volunteers in Policing (VIP)



In the aftermath of September 11th, President Bush, in his 2002 State of the Union Address, called upon citizens to volunteer their services in his newly formed USA Freedom Corps and Citizen's Corps programs. One organizational offshoot of these was announced and initiated as the Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS). Across the country people were requested to volunteer to help their local law enforcement agencies. The main thrust of this was to enable citizen-volunteers to train and become proficient in non-hazardous, routine police tasks in order to free up professional police officers to spend more time in combating and preventing crime and terrorism.

When this Federal Program was announced, the Redondo Beach Police Department found itself far ahead of the game. In 1994, the Department started recruiting qualified, community minded men and women as Volunteers-In-Policing (VIP). Since that time Redondo Beach VIPs have established an impressive record in providing support to the RBPD staff and assisting in building community confidence and awareness in law enforcement. Their duties and numbers continue to expand. Our volunteer force keeps busy by contacting citizens and businesses with crime prevention materials; performing vacation security checks; monitoring city parks and schools; checking handicapped parking spaces and citing violators; detecting/processing graffiti crime reports; insuring graffiti removal; assisting at DUI/Driver's License checkpoints; performing traffic control duties at community marathons and other events; and other duties as assigned. VIPs operate a specially marked police vehicle, utilize police radios and wear a distinctive volunteer uniform. They are also on call to assist in lost child searches and other emergency situations.



Individuals selected as VIPs must put in a minimum of four hours per week, however most exceed this requirement. VIPs are trained to perform assigned duties with a friendly, customer oriented approach and to apply common sense to the varied situations they encounter. They do not become involved with hazardous situations of any type. If any type of confrontation looms, they back away and call for Police Officer support. When on patrol they serve as an extra set of eyes and ears for the Police Department. They maintain two-way radio contact with the Redondo Beach Police Department Dispatch Center at all times.

Primary recruitment for the VIPs focuses on persons who either live or work within or in close proximity to Redondo Beach. Anyone interested in volunteering their time to this program is encouraged to apply. Applicants will be contacted for an interview. They will then be asked to provide the necessary information to complete a background check. **Interested persons can contact Officer Michael Diehr at mike.diehr@redondo.org or at 310-379-2477, x2493.**

What is Household Hazardous Waste? Household hazardous waste is any product labeled: toxic, poison, corrosive, flammable, combustible, or irritant that needs to be discarded. A typical home can contain a vast array of household hazardous products used for cleaning, painting, and disinfecting the house, garage, and yard. These items include paint, cleaners with acid or lye, pesticides, herbicides, paint thinner, car batteries, motor oil and oil filters, antifreeze, and expired medications.

Bring the items in a sturdy box, preferably in their original labeled containers. Do not mix the items together. There is a limit of 15 gallons or 125 pounds of hazardous waste per trip.

ALSO BRING YOUR UNIVERSAL WASTE ITEMS SUCH AS:

- **BATTERIES** - Such as AA, AAA, C, D cells and button batteries (e.g. hearing aid batteries). These may contain a corrosive chemical that can cause burns.
- **FLUORESCENT TUBES AND BULBS AND OTHER MERCURY-CONTAINING LAMPS** – Fluorescent light tubes and bulbs, high intensity discharge (HID), sodium, and neon bulbs.
- **MERCURY-CONTAINING DEVICES** - Such as thermostats, switches, and thermometers.
- **SHARPS (needle syringes) AND EXPIRED MEDICATION.**

PLEASE DO NOT BRING: EXPLOSIVES, AMMUNITION AND RADIOACTIVE MATERIALS

HAZARDOUS WASTE FROM BUSINESSES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED AT THIS EVENT

Bulky Items and Electronic Waste

Free pickup of bulky items and electronic waste is offered to customers residing in houses, apartments, townhomes, condominiums and mobile home parks. Examples of acceptable items include: couches, chairs, washers, dryers, water heaters, mattresses, refrigerators, rugs and tree trunks. Examples of e-waste include: televisions, VCRs, cell phones, stereos, computer monitors, and microwaves. Items not allowed for bulky item collection service are automobile and marine bodies and parts, and construction waste.

To schedule a pickup

- Call two days in advance of your normal collection day to Athens Services at: **(855)557-1007**.
- If you have curbside collection service, place your bulky items curbside next to your cart by 7am on the scheduled collection day. If you have bin service, place the items next to the trash bin.
- All rugs, bushes, branches and lumber must be cut and tied in bundles no longer than four (4) feet in length and weigh less than 60 lbs.
- **There is a limit of 4 bulky items per week.**

Household Hazardous Waste

Household hazardous waste (HHW) is any product labeled: toxic, poison, corrosive, flammable, combustible or irritant. Many are common household products and when these products are discarded, they become "household hazardous waste". If these products are handled or disposed of incorrectly, they can pose a threat to human health, animals, and the environment. It is illegal to dispose of HHW in the trash, down the drain, or by abandonment. Examples of HHW are: paint, motor oil, pesticides and solvents.

Universal waste (U-Waste) comes primarily from consumer products containing mercury, lead, cadmium and other substances that are hazardous to human health and the environment. Examples of U-Waste are: batteries, fluorescent light tubes, compact bulbs or CFL, thermometers, thermostats and various electronic devices.

As an added convenience, household batteries and CFL light bulbs are also collected year-round at the following locations:

West Basin Municipal Water District
**Commitment to Water Efficiency:
 Redondo Beach Unified School District**

As Southern California continues to experience severe drought conditions, Redondo Beach Unified School District (RBUSD) serves as a positive example of a water-efficient lifestyle. Through the proactive participation in the community programs offered by the West Basin Municipal Water District (West Basin) and Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD), RBUSD schools have demonstrated a commendable commitment to water conservation and water recycling.

Learning to Conserve

Redondo Union High School (RUHS) both practices and teaches important water conservation skills. The school's Advanced Placement Environmental Science (APES) class conducts campus-wide water audits, studies ways to conserve drinking water, performs water quality testing and implements ways to capture and retain storm water runoff. In June 2016, APES students learned how to create and maintain its own drought-resistant garden on campus when West Basin led a hands-on workshop as part of the Ocean Friendly Garden program.

The high school has also sought out MWD's Community Partnering Grant which would provide funding for water education and water related projects. Should the school become a recipient, the grant funds would allow the APES students to develop signage to educate the 2,700 student body about sustainable water use on campus. The signs would improve awareness of green practices already in place and create a culture of conservation to encourage students to do more.

Recycled Water on Campus

RUHS and West Basin also kicked off the 2016-17 school year with the expanded use of recycled water, which will now serve the entire RUHS campus. Since 2010, the east side of campus has utilized West Basin's recycled water for irrigation purposes. Now the west side of the grounds will also use the sustainable water source instead of potable water for irrigation.

With RUHS as a successful example of recycled water usage on campus, RBUSD is currently collaborating with the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, California Water Service and West Basin to convert Jefferson Elementary to the use of recycled water.

Additionally, RBUSD applied for MWD's turf removal program for two schools within the district. Still a work in progress, the school district looks to replace 188,000 square feet of turf at Adams Middle School and approximately 37,000 square feet of turf at Alta Vista Middle School. RBUSD also worked with West Basin to provide free smart sprinkler controllers to several schools.

RBUSD continues to prioritize the practice of conservation as a way of life and has made significant strides in sharing this mindset with their students and the larger community. West Basin commends their efforts and looks forward to continued partnerships in their pursuit of a water-efficient lifestyle.
